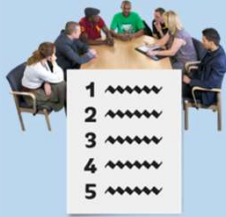

What is a Hate Crime?



Hate crime is when someone does a crime to another person, because of who they think they are.



It can also include mate crime - this is when someone a person knows takes advantage of their friendship to do something against the law.

What is a Hate Crime?



Types of hate crime:



Disability (physical or learning disability)



Sexual orientation (if someone is straight, gay, lesbian or bisexual)



Nationality or race



Religion



Gender (if someone is a man, woman or transgender)

What is a Hate Crime?



Examples of hate crime:



Verbal abuse - saying bad things to someone



Hurting someone



Bullying



Damaging things that belong to someone else



Threats - saying that someone will do something bad to another person



It can also include mate crime - this is when someone a person knows takes advantage of their friendship to do something against the law.



What is a Learning Disability Hate Crime?



A Learning Disability Hate Crime is when someone does a crime to another person, because of **prejudice** to them because of their Learning Disability

Prejudice means:

Treating someone badly because of who they are



Examples of Learning Disability Hate Crime



Bullying for example verbal abuse - saying bad things to someone about their Learning Disability for example "spastic" or "retard"



Cuckooing – when someone uses your home to do criminal activity for example drugs, storing stolen goods or prostitution



Sexual assault (forcing someone to have sex or do something sexual)



Physical abuse by a carer



Mate crime - for example someone making friends with a person with a learning disability so they can steal their money



Recognising Hate Crime



How can you tell between a **crime** and a **hate crime**?





Recognising Hate Crime



The person needs to be committing a crime and **also** treating them badly because of their Learning Disability when they do the crime

Reporting a Hate Crime

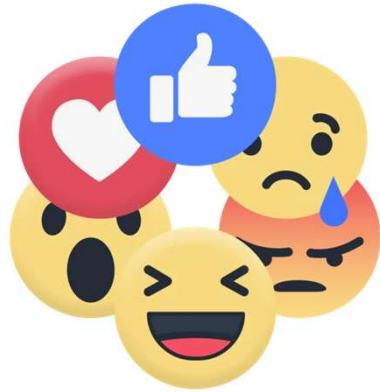


Did you know?
